Up from the Roots: A Community Poem Project


Poem Lown ST. JOHNSBURY | 2022

About Huck Gutman



A former Chief of Staff to Sen. Bernie Sanders, he has also twice been a Fulbright Scholar, in Portugal and in India. David Martin

If I'd known as a child that I was going to be a picture book writer, I certainly would have wanted to live in the Northeast Kingdom. It sounds so right. But I never had a clue about that growing up in Queens. I tell classes of students I visit, writing wasn't on the bottom of my *When I grow up I want to be a ...* list. It wasn't on the list.

As for picture books, I didn't know much about them until I was reading to my own children. Then in 1979, while working at the Community College of VT in St Johnsbury, I told Mary, a colleague, about a vacation trip my family and I made to NYC. She said that she and her husband couldn't leave their

place because they had farm animals to take care of. From that came "Gator and Mary's Traveling Band."

When I showed it to my friend and mentor, June Elliott, she said, "I hope you're not going to be a one book author." I hoped so too, but it was ten years before the Lizzie Books came out. And now I've published many. Honestly it's all still a surprise to me. How I came to live in the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont, that's a whole other story.

Shanta Lee Gander Poetry Reading via Zoom Wednesday, April 20, 2022


