Sounds and Objects Papermaking Collaborations: Janus Press Opening Reception Sunday, September 10, 4 pm




Papermaking Collaborations will exhibit works by Janus Press (founded by Claire Van Vliet nearly 70 years ago). John Buchtel, Ph.D., Curator of Rare Books and Head of Special Collections at the Boston Athenaeum, is the featured speaker. His talk will illuminate the resonance between the physical book and the poetry and prose being displayed.

The exhibit will include a selection of Claire's pulp paintings and six particular books: *Circle of Wisdom, Batterers, Lilac Wind, Watermarks, The Dream of the Dirty Woman*, and *Aura*.

The Denial of Death in America
Wednesday, September 13, 7 pm




A theatrical presentation/performance on the denial of death in American society, followed by a discussion with the performer – Darryll Rudy – who has Alzheimer's Disease and is in the process of dealing with his own death head-on.

Through 50+ years of Buddhist practice, 80 years of aging, and three years of living with his Alzheimer's diagnosis, Darryll has come to grips with the inevitability of his life's end. At the same time, he has noticed how we rarely – if ever – talk about or acknowledge the fact that we all will die someday. This event is an invitation to change that.

Sounds and Objects David Godine: Five Decades of Independent Publishing Sunday, September 17, 4 pm



David R. Godine was born in Cambridge and educated at Dartmouth College, and Harvard University. After a brief stint in the Army, he worked for year as a printing apprentice to Harold McGrath at Leonard Baskin's Gehenna Press in Northampton, MA.

In 1970, along with co-founders Lance Hidy and Martha Rockwell, he converted an abandoned cow barn on a Brookline estate into a printing office from which the company began issuing broadsides, pamphlets, and ultimately books, mostly printed from hot metal.

By 1975, both the barn and the ambition to make a living as letterpress printers were abandoned in favor of publishing. The company moved to offices in Boston's Back Bay and subsequently to other locations in the area, remaining a part of the city's publishing fabric until this day.

Death Comes to the Athenaeum Dying to Talk About It A Forum on Death and Dying Well Thursday, September 20, 7 pm





Sounds and Objects Sydney Lea: Poetry Reading and Book Signing Sunday, September 24, 4 pm



Sydney Lea was Poet Laureate of Vermont from 2011-2015. In 2021, He received Vermont's highest artistic distinction, The Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts.

In 2022, he published *Seen from all Sides: Lyric and Everyday Life*, a collection of newspaper columns on poetry, composed during Lea's laureate tenure. A third edition of *Roads Taken: Contemporary Vermont Poets*, an anthology he co-edited with Chard deNiord, his successor as state poet, is now available.

His sixteenth collection of poems–*What Shines*–is due in September 2023. In early 2024, his collection of personal essays, *Such Dancing as I Can*, will appear, and later in the year, his second novel, *Now Look*.


Events for Everyone
